Question 11 (2 marks)

Identify a special need that a chronically ill person might have, and explain how it can be met.

A chronically ill person may wish to be at home and require home care. This need can be met through family members and sometimes the local hospital.

Explain ONE ethical guideline/procedure you would follow when conducting qualitative research involving people who are chronically ill.

Make sure you word questions that you are going to ask carefully, as you do not want to offend the person or the illness that they have.

Question 13 (3 marks)

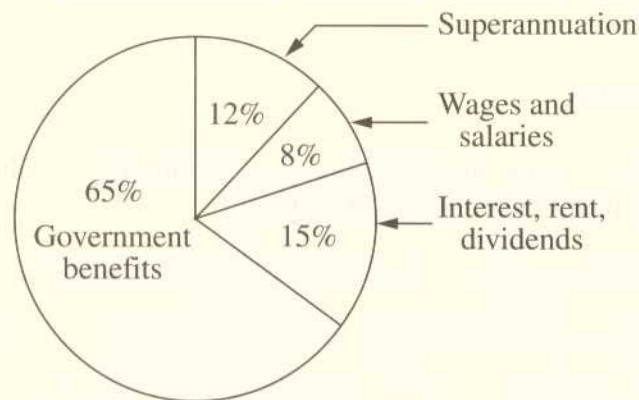
Outline the sequence of steps to be followed when conducting a research project.

Firstly pick a topic. Then consider all the aspects you (~~which are~~) wish to cover within that topic. Decide which methodologies you wish to use taking ethical considerations into account with some of them. Organise all your research and write your final project.

Question 14 (4 marks)

Researchers have conducted a study in their local community to investigate the sources of income of aged people.

The results are shown in the graph.



Sources of income of aged people

Account for the data in the graph.

A majority of aged people choose not to work at all, therefore the Government benefits being very high and the wages and salaries being quite low at 8%. Not all aged people have superannuation or interest, rent, dividends.

Question 15 (4 marks)

Describe TWO strategies that parents can use to manage multiple-role expectations arising from work and family commitments.

First strategy could be to work out between the couple who will take on the majority of stay-home parenting and the other the full-time work.

Second strategy could be to work out a schedule of their routines. Who will be first home? - they can cook dinner, the other might wash up. Share the household tasks to a certain extent.
