A common criticism of Donne is that the poetry is unrealistic - as Samul Johnson wrote Cial The lives of Poets 1779'] - "their amplification had no limits?"

In saying "To warme the world, that's done in worming is " Posne is effectively saying that the too loves are the world. This has commonly been interpreted as a very corrogent assertion, but it is absolutely true of ordinary huma experience. when two people are in love, they may as well be the world - everyone and everything else are illusions So Pone, through his use of one or extendy personal voice and conceit is merely describing the



real morture of love - and all its shades of emotion.

This very physical magery, compounded by tre son repetition of "mee" in "Divorce mee" "Imprison mee" and "vanish mee" agricall as he violence of the final paradoxical images - all show the true desperation

mal Cear Mousing that he is feeling. It must be



remembered, that to Danne, judgenest, heaven and hell were physical realities, not just states of mind. So who he is asking for spiritual intervention in Such Personal and immediate terms - the strength of his dirvine devation is immediate about clear.

"Lawis' concerns recho te concerns of & critics who fear that style has over come substance in Donne's wak, and his personal voice is not genuine, but rather contrived for the pleasure of his andress. A. Awarez (In 'The school of Donne') engressed this as Dome being "a wit writing for wits." In other words , Donne used to try personal form al poetry as a medium for creating challenging concerts and puzzles for his audience of spar-class intellectuals to some and enjoy. But pungos tre affect of Done's qualience that it served to liber gte win Son tradition. The fact that they were not proffessional poets may have served to bee Dome from hoving to write wholly accepted form prome This is turn enabled him to develop the very personal and original voice that his poery employs.



The nature of Dome's personal vaice has invariably
shaped the way readers have responded to it one
time, both emotionally and intellectually. His wit and
realism, as well as his aran a and intensity of emotion
create poetry which persistently affects response - whether it
be avid support or venement criticism. Fitterway, the
