Assess how useful Sources C and D would be for an historian studying the Allies' approaches to Germany at the Paris Peace Conference.

In your answer, consider the perspectives provided by the two sources, and their reliability.

Both sources on C, D have to different countries discussing on Germany Woodrow Wilson and a note by the German government. The Paris Peace Conference was held by the three big nations such as the British, French and Americans.
