Usefulness for studying the Allies' approach ~~at~~ to the peace conference is limited because it gives no ~~useful~~ information concerning the attitudes of Clemenceau - France - or Lloyd George - Great Britain - though it does present a complete ~~picture~~ ^{summary} of American attitudes.

Source D is very similar, its reliability is ~~again~~ high because it is consistent ~~with~~ with the attitudes of the German movement and it is known that they protested the draft of the Versailles treaty. ~~However the primary source in this case - as for source B, is not quoted - we don't know from where how accurate~~ Unlike source C it is taken, presumably directly from a written document and so its accuracy is ~~undoubtedly~~ unquestionable, ^{contributing} ~~giving~~ to its high reliability. Its usefulness, however is again only limited. It only provides information concerning the attitudes of the eventual treaty - which was a compromise. It tells us that any number of the Allies believed Germany was at fault but not which one(s). Other than this it provides no information concerning the attitudes ^{of} ~~of~~ the Allies brought to the conference.
