Baptism is the Unstian initiation rite of passage that marks a persons entry to the Christian faith. This is an essential winponent of all denominations (except for salvation Army and the Quarters) as a purification and rebirthing process. The Chemonial application of water (through aspersion, affusion or immension) represents the cleansing of original sin before God, and is performed either in infancy (catholics, Anglicans, Orthodox) or during adult hood, "believers baptism" (Baptist, Pentecoster) Baptism is deemed a necessary component for salvation; "No one can see the lungdom of God unless he has been born again" and in the catholic perspective "I the " necessary foundation and basic requirements for every christian uje " (catholic Catechism 1212). Baptism holds great scipnificance for both the individual and the community. On an individual uner, the person becomes 'saved 'through punification and is able to enter faith in a cleansed state. This rebirth allowsthem to be supported in their opinitual, Christian journey, naving the community present to support and encourage their initiation.
