

(a) Rabi'a al-Adawiyya was a significant Sufi to Islam as her contributions came from the concept of Divine Love. Although these were derived from the Sunna and Qur'an, Rabi'a taught adherents to love others through the Qur'an quote "If you love God, follow me and then God will love you." She also ~~taught~~ taught Muslims that misfortune and repentance are gifts from God as they can learn from their mistakes and Allah will always love them.

(b) Rabi'a al-Adawiyya had a large effect on Islam because of her teachings from her contribution called the concept of Divine Love in which she introduced:
Love without reward taught adherents to love Allah without waiting for a reward in return, such as a place in heaven. ~~Knowing~~ ~~was~~ her other teachings such as oneness with God and love for others taught adherents to stay on the right path and be true to Allah by doing what he had asked of his people.

Rabi'a was living during a time of wealth, power and decadence and she used this time to focus on her faith to achieve the ultimate quest on her path to God. Her effect was large as others passed on her teachings which continue to impact the lives of ~~others~~ Muslims.

(c) Friday prayer at the Mosque, or Jumuah, is obligatory for men but optional for women. It is a significant part of Islamic prayer where every Friday, Muslims gather as one body at a Mosque to give thanks and praise to Allah. This occurs on a Friday as many significant Islamic days are held on a Friday such as the resurrection day long awaited for which will be on ~~the~~ a Friday. During this Jumuah, wudu or ghusl takes place which is the cleansing of the body including the ears, eyes and mouth to discard any evil seen, heard or spoken before entering the mosque. Muslims then bow facing Mecca and recite prayers to Allah. These are both said out loud and communally or silently to be alone with Allah. The leader of the service will then ~~read~~ speak about ~~modern~~ events such as murder and stealing and link them to Islam how Allah does not allow this.
